# Healthy homes EBOP

This year, Trust Horizon provided the Retrofit Insulation Programme with a \$400,000 grant – bringing the Trust's total contribution over 23 years to more than \$11 million. Delivered by Brightr (formerly Smart Energy Solutions), the insulation scheme continues to play a key role in improving health outcomes and reducing energy demand in the community.

## Eastern Bay Energy Wellbeing Programme

A \$250,000 grant is helping launch a new energy wellbeing programme in the Eastern Bay. The programme was created by Sustainability Options, and is co-funded by Trust Horizon, BayTrust and the government. It provides community workshops, energy education, and funding for small home repairs – like broken windows – which can have a big impact on a home's energy efficiency.

# LED Lighting Project

In 2020, Trust Horizon partnered with Horizon Energy Group (HEG) and the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Authority (EECA) to provide free Ecobulbs to the community. Every home in the Eastern Bay received a voucher for five free Ecobulb LED lights, which have the potential to save the average home \$940 on their power bill over the next decade.

# House of Science Kits

House of Science's resource kits include a range of hands-on experiments, designed to inspire an interest in science for children in years 1 to 8. This year, Trust Horizon sponsored two 'Electric Futures' kits – which have reached as many as 1800 children. With the Trust's support Horizon Networks also provided funding for 5,000 activity books, with 2,500 books shared with local school communities to date.

## Rebuilding Through Adversity

## The Chairman and Trust Manager's Report

Across the second half of 2020 and the first six months of 2021, the effects of COVID-19 have continued to ripple through our local economy. This has had a particularly tangible impact on some of our most vulnerable communities, and has highlighted the inequities that still exist.

Trust Horizon's funding priority has been to support the community through this challenging time. Throughout 2020 and 2021, Horizon Energy Group (HEG) - our core investment - continued to operate. HEG was able to provide essential services through the COVIDrelated lockdowns, and played a key role in keeping the country's hospitals, food suppliers, and industrial processes operational. This shone a light on the company's value as a leading infrastructure services provider.

### Supporting meaningful and purposeful change.

Faced with the uncertainty of COVID-19, many businesses - including our own investments - made the decision to conserve cash. This limited the amount of funding available to the Trust this year. However, through strong partnerships with community, iwi, other funders, and local, regional and national government, Trust Horizon has been able to ensure those limited funds can create a great impact.

From our long-standing support of the Retrofit insulation programme, to the delivery of over 65,000 free energy efficient LED light bulbs to the community, to launching the 20 Degrees programme in the Eastern Bay, our energy has been focused on energy-related projects that bring lasting benefits to the region.

This year also saw the Trust's new impact investing strategy continue its upwards trajectory. Our investment in Whakatōhea Mussels Öpötiki Limited, alongside shareholders and government, has been a catalyst for growth in local employment opportunities – and has led to the creation of an exciting new aquaculture industry for the Eastern Bay.

## Changes in Governance & Management

In mid-2021, Trust Horizon trustee Don Lewell retired from the Board after more than a decade on the team. For a majority of his time with the Trust, Don held the role of Chairman. In his tenure, he oversaw the Trust's transition into a Charity, and the strategically critical and highly beneficial purchase of 100% of Horizon Energy Group. We would like to acknowledge Don, and thank him for his contribution and leadership of the Trust over the years. In May, David Glover stepped into Don's shoes as our newest appointed trustee. His extensive governance, marketing, and educational experience make him a valuable addition to the team, and we wish him a warm welcome.

The coming year will bring more changes to the Board table, with our biennial elections for the Whakatāne and Kaingaroa Districts set for August and

September. This is an opportunity for the local community to have their say, and we encourage all eligible Eastern Bay residents to cast their vote.

After six years with Trust Horizon, including managing the rebrand and new strategy, Trust Manager Rawinia Kamau left to pursue regional development opportunities in August 2020. Derek Caudwell joined the team in January 2021 as new Trust Manager, having previously held senior management roles at HEG.

Last year, the Trust rebranded from Eastern Bay Energy Trust to Trust Horizon. Our new name and new look was created to reflect our new direction, vision, and mission. This year, the new brand has continued to build momentum – with the redevelopment of educational material, and Te Reo versions now available.

#### The strategy for the year ahead.

Transformational investing takes strong leadership and clear direction, and in the coming year we plan to continue to deliver both. The conservative approach taken by HEG last year is forecast to give the Trust a boost in this year's available funds, which we look forward to putting towards high-impact investments and local community grants.

In support of our vision to enable pride, prosperity and people, the Trust has sponsored the new Sustainability Excellence Award at the Horizon Energy Group Business Excellence Awards. By celebrating those who are embodying the circular economy and sustainable practices, we hope to inspire even more local businesses to look to a more sustainable future.

Looking inwards, the Trust has joined the Sustainable Business Network; a social enterprise seeking to transform New Zealand's leading ideas in climate, waste, and water into action. We are also looking to align our investing and grant-making towards a more sustainable and low-carbon economy here in the Eastern Bay of Plenty.

In the year to come, our focus will be on using the Trust's funds to expand opportunities to recycle capital, and bring benefits to the community through energy-related projects. We look forward to partnering with further like-minded organisations and iwi. So we can have an even greater impact on the community, and enable local pride, prosperity, and people.

# Whakatōhea Mussels

The Trust's investment in Ōpōtiki's Whakatōhea Mussels is a great example of our focus on impact investing. The funds have enabled the expansion of the sea farm, purchase of a new harvesting vessel, and constructing a land-based processing plant. Through direct employment and establishing a wider aquaculture industry in the Eastern Bay, the investment has the potential to bring long-lasting benefits to the community.









Trust Horizon's investment portfolio includes \$165 million in net assets, all held on behalf of – and for the benefit of – the Eastern Bay of Plenty District. Horizon Energy Group is the largest investment in the Trust's portfolio. The company continues to grow from strength to strength, offering employment opportunities locally and across New Zealand.

Aside from its investment in HEG, the Trust has allocated up to 20% of its portfolio to local impact investments - including Whakatōhea Mussels and OTK orchards. Further investments will be made in companies, organisations, and funds who share the Trust's intention to generate positive social or environmental impacts, as well as financial returns. The remainder will be allocated to a diversified and liquid fund portfolio.



## Te Tāhuhu o Te Rangi Project

The Trust has provided a \$225,000 grant to cover the electrical component of the Te Tāhuhu o Te Rangi project, which will see a brand new Technology and Research Centre built in the heart of Ōpōtiki. Due for completion in September 2021, the centre aims to create a range of new learning opportunities for Ōpōtiki residents.

## Kawerau Skatepark

Kawerau District Council's Skatepark's existing floodlight poles and luminaries were badly degraded and in need of repairs, creating visibility and safety issues. Trust Horizon provided the funding needed to install additional lighting, which also allowed the park's CCTV system to be reinstated. With the new lighting in place, the community can continue to use the skatepark and basketball court safely, day or night.

## Whakatāne Aquatic Centre Pool Cover

Trust Horizon contributed \$400,000 to the all-weather pool cover enclosure at the Whakatāne Aquatic Centre. The cover opens up the use of the outdoor pool year-round, helping the facility cater to the region's ever-growing population. The gas heating system was also upgraded to an electric heat pump – bringing significant environmental and cost benefits.

# An update from Horizon Energy Group

## Stronger As One Kia kotahi ai tatou

# Key Networks **Projects**

### Improving network reliability

Horizon Network's 33kV Te Rahu North and Central are configured as a dual circuit on the same structure. This configuration poses the risk of losing both circuits in case of a single event. This project will split Te Rahu North and Te Rahu Central into separate structures, improving system resilience and reliability. The project will also separate Te Rahu South from Whakatāne Board Mill (WBM) South 33kV feeders, providing increased network reliability. The project is slated for completion by October 2021.

## Enabling future growth in the **Opōtiki** district

Horizon is planning to establish a 33kV supply to Opotiki township by mid-2025, to enable existing and future growth of the region. This project involves acquiring the Transpower-owned 11/50kV step-up transformer that supplies Te Kaha from Waiotahi. The transformer, currently designated as Waiotahi T5, will be moved from Transpower's Waiotahi GXP and recommissioned at Horizon's Ōpōtiki Substation to supply Te Kaha. The relocation of this transformer will allow an additional feeder to supply the Ōpōtiki Substation, which Horizon plans to operate at 33kV in the future.





## Reducing the risk of unplanned outages

Horizon Networks has developed a multi-year programme aiming at improving reliability of supply to the Te Kaha region. In 2018, Horizon Networks completed its acquisition of the 66km Te Kaha 50kV line, supplying the Te Kaha region. The 50kV line transverses through very rugged terrain and is prone to coastal (salt air) corrosion.

In 2019-2020, new sectionalised steel poles were developed, and will be used to replace the existing poles – which are in poor condition.

The standard design provides significant improvements in constructability and flexibility, and is more efficient than conventional concrete poles. In 2020-2021, Horizon Networks replaced six poles and three crossarms. The 2021-2022 works programme will see Horizon Networks replace five poles and four crossarms, to reduce the risk of unplanned outages for Te Kaha customers. This work is expected to be completed by March 2022.

### Re-development of Asset Management Plan

Horizon Networks has been on a journey to enhance the presentation of the information and investment plans in its Asset Management Plan – embodying the spirit of continuous improvement. Last year's AMP presented Horizon's risk-based approach towards investment optimisation. AMP 2022-2023 redevelopment is setting out to address areas of interest for our shareholder, community, and customers – such as Horizon's approach towards climate change, decarbonisation, new consumer technologies (solar, batteries and electric vehicles), and large-scale industrial electrification.

## Optimising network investment

Horizon Networks has made improvements to its asset management practices and managing network risks. Improvements were made to fleet investment models, which allowed Horizon Networks to transition from an age-based fleet management approach to a risk-based approach.

To achieve better efficiencies, Horizon Networks has also adopted a new approach in managing pole top assets – which allows investment optimisations in pole and pole hardware replacement programmes.



## Introducing David Glover Our newest Trustee

In May 2021, David Glover joined Trust Horizon as our newest appointed trustee. David fills the role left behind by Don Lewell, who departed the Trust this year after more than a decade on the Board.

David brings more than 30 years of senior executive experience to the Trust. After a successful career in international marketing, David shifted into the education sector as CEO of a number of private and governmentowned businesses. His broad governance experience across an equally broad range of industries makes him a valuable addition to the team.

As a trustee, David is excited to play a role in bringing Trust Horizon's strategic focus on impact investing to life. He looks forward to getting to know the Eastern Bay's communities, and helping create positive and lasting change.

# Trustee Elections 2021

## Have your say

Of Trust Horizon's six trustees, two are appointed, and four are elected by the community. This year, there'll be an election for the two trustees who will represent the Trust's beneficiaries in the Whakatāne District Council/Kaingaroa Village area.

These two trustees will be responsible for administering the Trust under the terms of the Trust Deed and Trustee law, and enabling the Trust to create transformational change in the community.

#### When and how to cast your vote

To be eligible to vote for a trustee, you need To be a Horizon Energy electricity network consumer within the Whakatāne District Council/Kaingaroa Village area.

#### There are several ways you can cast your vote:

- Voting online (using the unique voter credentials shown on your voting paper)
- Posting your completed voting documents back to the electoral officer using the freepost envelope included in your voting pack
- Hand-delivering your completed voting paper to a ballot box at the Trust Horizon office.

Voting papers will be posted to eligible consumers from Friday 10th September, 2021.
